RACIAL CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE ORDER

After World War 1 saw great growth of the Knights along with the country. The Roaring Twenties as this time was referred to lasting for a short time as the country grew. During the 1920s there was growing anti-Semitism in the United States, a lingering anti-German sentiment left over from World War I, and anti-black violence was prevalent throughout the country. To combat this hostility targeted at racial and religious minorities, including Catholics, the Knights of Columbus formed a historical commission which published a series of books, among other activities. The "Knights of Columbus Racial Contributions Series" of books included three titles: The Gift of Black Folk, by W. E. B. Du Bois, The Jews in the Making of America by George Cohen, and The Germans in the Making of America by Frederick Schrade

In 1924, the Knights of Columbus commissioned and published a groundbreaking book by civil rights pioneer W.E.B. DuBois that promoted racial equality and documented the varied contributions of African Americans. The Knights, were ahead of its time because "the ideal 'that all men are created equal' was more a philosophical statement than a practical reality for millions."

October 29, 1929, The Wall Street Crash, Black Tuesday, The Great Crash, The Stock Market Crash 29, or The Great Depression, no matter what it was called, it initially had a detrimental effect on the Order's membership and finances, but it also led to a renewed sense of volunteer service. The crash brought the Roaring Twenties to a shuddering halt. The crash marked the beginning of widespread and long-lasting consequences. Over the next several years, consumer spending and investment dropped, causing steep declines in industrial output and rising levels of unemployment as failing companies laid off workers. Membership dropped off considerably in the early 1930's. It was pay your dues to belong to the order or put food on the table. Man were out of work by the millions. Some abandoned their families and took to the road the rails looking for greener pastures. Most never came back the family they left, abandoning them to fend for themselves. Banks were failing by the thousands and with them they took the savings with them. No government guarantees existed at that time. The money the average person put in the bank was now going.

Some councils opened soup kitchens to feed the hungry. Others gather food from abandoned farms and distributed what they could. It was not until the success of an extensive membership campaign in 1935, titled Mobilization for Catholic Action, led to the establishment of the Order's Service Department, which subsequently launched a "Five-Point Program of Progress." The program encouraged councils to play a more active role in the

Growth is Our Primary Responsibility

At a recent meeting Supreme Knight Carl Anderson told the gathered "Our responsibility is to assure the continued growth and sustainability of our Order. This is our first and primary responsibility".

"While we have other goals and activities that are necessary, no other task is sufficient to advance the Good of the Order, if we do not advance membership growth. Everything we do depends upon membership,"

Today there is a challenge that has to be met, he continued. Supreme Knight Anderson pointed out that the Knights of Columbus must recruit younger men and fathers of young families. Our councils need to emphasize programs more relevant to families with young children and we need to use recruitment tools that rely upon enhanced Internet and web-based connectivity he said.

It is necessary, to recruit younger members in ways that respect the more limited time they have to dedicate to volunteer activities and to schedule council activities in ways that respond to the more limited time young fathers have to participate in activities outside the home.

To help train our council's officers and make volunteer efforts more efficient, the Knights of Columbus has developed the Fraternal Training Portal. These training program include information on promoting fraternal leadership skills, and instill organizational awareness of the vision of our founder and the legacy mission. Training will be available for current officers over the coming months.

He went on to say, "Our building the domestic church while strengthening our parish initiative combines two great traditions of the Knights of Columbus: building up Catholic family life and strengthening parish life,"

Some of these programs will help make our parishes more family friendly, especially for young families. The Family Fully Alive program includes monthly themes, meditations, Scripture readings and activities for the whole family. It is a program for all families, but it is designed especially for young families. It can help families that need new ways to bring the light of the Gospel into their homes.

His message goes on, but it must be noted that it is the responsibility of every Knight to at least attempt to recruit one new knight. Also to set our focus on the younger men of this parish.

Brother Bob DePaola requested prayers for his grandson Scott, who is seriously ill, his Mother Dana wrote, "The doctors at The Mayo Clinic went over all the lab tests and x-rays. The consensus is they are going to continue treating him with MS meds. Also, the surgery behind the left eye was a failure. He is

now totally blind in that eye now and has only one eight in his sight in his right eye. They say he will more than likely be totally blind in about a month. So please pray."

Brother Bob De Paola is being treated for a lower back condition affecting his activity level due to severe pain requiring chiropractic attention. Brother Bob also requests prayers for his wife Rita. He took her to the emergency room with chest pains and a rapid heartbeat. After 7 ½ hours in ER they were able to reduce her heart beat from 160 plus beats a minute closer to the normal of 60 a minute. She was admitted to the hospital for observation for 3 days. They finally determined she was suffering from pancreatitis. It seems the pancreas was inflamed pushing up interfering with the normal operation of the heart. She is now home resting. She is on a new medication that makes her sleepy.

Brother Ron Conser wrote: "My friends and coworkers Paul and Kathy Jansen son Jacob was diagnosed with a brain tumor. As of right now they have to wait on test results before they can schedule surgery. The surgeons are planning on a surgery to remove a small amount of the tumor that they can safely reached, as the location of the tumor is not in a very accessible area of the brain. The piece they are attempting to remove will hopefully relieve pressure to the brainstem as well as provide a sample for further testing. The Jansen's are wonderful Christians.

Update on the surgery, the first surgery was a success and Jacob is almost back to his normal self, but that is just the start. The surgeons advised if they do nothing with Jacob, he might have 6 months to live in his current progression..., so intervention is defiantly needed. Further surgery is not the option as it will leave Jacob in a vegetative state and after a year of therapy may gain 70% function. The last option is Radiation and Chemo. He will start his radiation and chemo within a couple days. His initial course of treatment with the radiation is 5 days a week for 6 weeks. They will do an MRI thereafter to verify effectiveness of the treatment, and start Chemo.

life of the local parish and community, and included five categories: Catholic activity, council activity, fraternal protection, publicity and maintenance of manpower.

In 1932 in an effort to highlight the 50th Anniversary is celebrated with Commemoration Week, June 24-30, 1932. Among the highlights is the unveiling in Washington, D.C. of a statue of Cardinal James Gibbons, an early supporter of the Knights who had ordained Father McGivney.

Also in the early 1930s, violent persecution resurfaced in Mexico, prompting the Order's leadership to strongly urge the U.S. government to take action. Mexicans were often imprisoned for wearing religious items, in public, or for even questioning the laws. Public worship was a crime punishable by hanging or firing squad. For over 70 years during the 20th century the Catholic Church was actually outlawed not allowed to own property. run schools, convents or monasteries, have more than a certain number of priests (and no foreign priests), nor defend itself publicly or in the courts. It was hardly allowed to exist. Tensions in Mexico eventually eased in 1937, but the threat of atheistic communism was growing in Europe as well. On July 8, 1935, Supreme Knight Martin Carmody and other K of C officials meet with President Franklin D. Roosevelt about the ongoing situation in Mexico. In response, the Knights organized anti-communist rallies in early 1937. When Pope Pius XI's encyclical on the subject, Divini Redemptoris, was released in March of that year, the Order printed and distributed a million copies. The Knights also sponsored a new lecture tour and expanded its anticommunism program to include a Crusade for Social Justice. "Injustice to man is the seed of communistic growth," Supreme Knight Martin Carmody said. "With Truth and Charity as your weapons, go forth as a Crusade."

Less than two weeks after World War II is declared on September 1, 1939, the Canadian Knights established a welfare program for soldiers comparable to the KC huts program that operated during World War I. Within a year, Canadian Knights raise nearly \$250,000 to support troops.

RESPECTING LIFE

Have you ever wondered what it might be like to be an active part of history? To be a part of something bigger then you, something that stands out from the day-to-day routines of life?

We are entering a phase in our country's history in which those who seek to end life are trying to gain the upper hand. We are at a crossroads in history, a time where life has been cheapened in the name of "personal choice", of "freedoms" that are actually chains that prevent us from being the best people we can be.

Most of you are aware of the recent legislation signed by Governor Jerry Brown (a purported Catholic) that allows doctors (and, ultimately, other health care personnel such as nurses, physician assistants and nurse practitioners) to prescribe drugs with the intent and purpose of helping people to kill themselves.

One of the most infamous decisions, exactly like the one we face today, occurred in Nazi Germany in the 1930's. It was a decision to kill people who were deemed "life unworthy of life". This included Down's patients (called mongoloids at that time); the mentally handicapped and those with chronic, debilitating illnesses.

Today, the culture of death has cleared another milestone on the pathway to indiscriminate euthanasia- the idea that each of us has the right to decide to kill ourselves, and the right to demand that health care personnel be allowed to "assist" in this killing.

This is a perverse contradiction of the role of physicians and other medical personnel. This is exactly what the Nazis did during the 1930's-'40's. Physicians were given the role of deciding who was to live and who should die, based on their value to the Nazi state. Human life was objectified, demeaned to the level of mere animals, to be euthanized as necessary to maintain the "health and purity "of the Nazi state. The Nazis pushing these ideas felt that the infirm, the chronically ill, the mentally disabled were a BURDEN

to the state and to the society around them. Does this sound familiar? Today, people who are aging, facing terminal cancer or other illnesses, are encouraged to think of themselves as a "burden", and that seeking a premature termination of their lives is really "OK".

Think of it. The cost of health care, the physical and emotional burden posed by those conditions described above, is leading to a similar rationale that the Nazis used. Imagine the financial strain on the insurance companies as the Boomers get older. The federal government is broke and Medicare is going further into debt. What better way to get rid of people, to convince them that they are a burden, that suicide is the "way out"?

Our Church teaches that each of us is a temple to the Holy Spirit, that each of us has inherent value in the eyes of God. When we become ill or disabled, we become a part of the experience of sacrifice and of giving. When we suffer, we become the person receiving the love and attention of those around us seeking to gain God's grace and love. Mother Theresa was a beautiful example of this type of love, AGAPE love.

The suffering individual is giving his pain to God and to those around him, in the hopes of regaining his health and freedom from pain and suffering.

For our society to assist in the killing of those who suffer, in a supposed compassionate action, is to surrender to the evil one, to support a concept that active killing is really a good, and not the intrinsic evil that it really is.

I want to encourage ALL OF MY FELLOW KNIGHTS to join together at the OneLifeLA Walk to be held in downtown Los Angeles on Saturday, January 21, 2017. The link for this is http://onelifela.org

Remember that respecting life, loving life goes across the life spectrum, from the moment each of us was conceived until each of us dies a natural death. Don't EVER consider yourself a burden when you suffer. Each of us, when we suffer, can help those around us to find favor with God and be redeemed.


